# Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in 2016



**5,479** people identified as being Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander



**2,824** dwellings - 39% more than the 2011 Census\*, although this number could be a lot higher – it is possible that "3,000 people in Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander households (almost 4 in 10) did not identify as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander"



**3.5%** of the total population identified as being Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander (NSW = 2.5%)



The western parts of Newcastle LGA had the highest number of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander residents:

- Wallsend Elermore Vale SA2 847 people in 420 dwellings
- Maryland Fletcher Minmi SA2 669 people in 275 dwellings
- Mayfield Warabrook SA2 312 dwellings housing 569 people



#### Aae

The age structure of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in 2016 were heavily skewed towards younger people, compared to the general population: \*



21% of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community were children 9 years and under (general population = 11%)



**51%** of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community were aged **24 years and under** (general population = 31%)



17% of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community were aged 50 years and over (general population = 34%)



5% of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community were aged 65 years and over (general population =16%)

Median age of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community =

**24 years** (NSW = 22)

Median age of the general population =

**38 years** (NSW = 38)

### Housing costs & tenure in 2016

Median monthly mortgage repayment = \$1,733 (general population = \$1,773)

Median weekly rent = \$320 (general population = \$340)

25% of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander households received rent assistance from the Australian Government (NSW = 28%)

57% rented (general population = 35%)

40% of households were either buying, or owned their own home (general population = 62%)

49% of rental households were managed by real estate agents; 27% by public housing

15% of households lived in public housing (general population = 5%)

## Employment and participation in the labour force

Workforce participation rate for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in 2016 = 61% (NSW = 54%) (general population in Newcastle LGA = 64%). Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men had a higher participation rate (64%) than women (58%).



52% of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people 15 years and over (almost 2,000 people) were employed in 2016.



Unemployment rate for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in 2016 = 15% (general population = 7%).

### The occupations of employed Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in 2016:

- More 'Professionals' than any other occupation
  (358 or 18%) (NSW = 24%) an increase of 53% since 2011
- 'Community and Personal Service Workers' = the second highest occupation at 17% (NSW = 10%) - an increase of 58% since 2011
- Proportion of Managers (6%) was much lower than the NSW = 14%, but had increased 27% since 2011
- Highest rate of growth since 2011 = 'Community and Personal Service Workers' and Labourers = 58% each



### **Education Levels**

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people over 15 years in 2016 were less likely to have educational qualifications than the general population:

### 11%

had a degree or higher (general population = 25%) (NSW Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people = 7%) 49%

had a tertiary qualification (including Certificates) (general population = 61%) (NSW Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people = 45%) **39%** 

had completed Year 12 (general population = 55%) (NSW Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people = 30%)

### Attendance at school education

There was an increase in school education of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children between 2011 and 2016

Preschool attendance increased by 81% since 2011

75% of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children aged 4–5 attended preschool in 2016 (general population = 78%) (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in NSW = 72%)

Secondary school attendance increased by 59% since 2011

84% of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children aged 12-17 attended secondary school in 2016 (general population = 92%) (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in NSW = 81%)



### Attendance at tertiary education

19% of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged 15-24 attended university or other tertiary institutions in 2016 (general population = 35%) (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in NSW = 7%)

### **Personal income**

In 2016, there was a significant difference in the average levels of personal income of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and the general population over 15 years, and differences between men and women:

The average weekly personal income in 2016 for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people:

people: \$65

31% less than the general population (\$960) (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in NSW = \$621)

men: \$696

65% of the overall male average for the Newcastle LGA, and \$28 higher than for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men in NSW

women: \$578

80% of the overall female average for the Newcastle LGA, and \$71 higher than for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women in NSW Proportionally more Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander adults were in the \$150–\$299 per week and nil/negative ranges

Proportionally fewer were in the \$1000+ per week range
