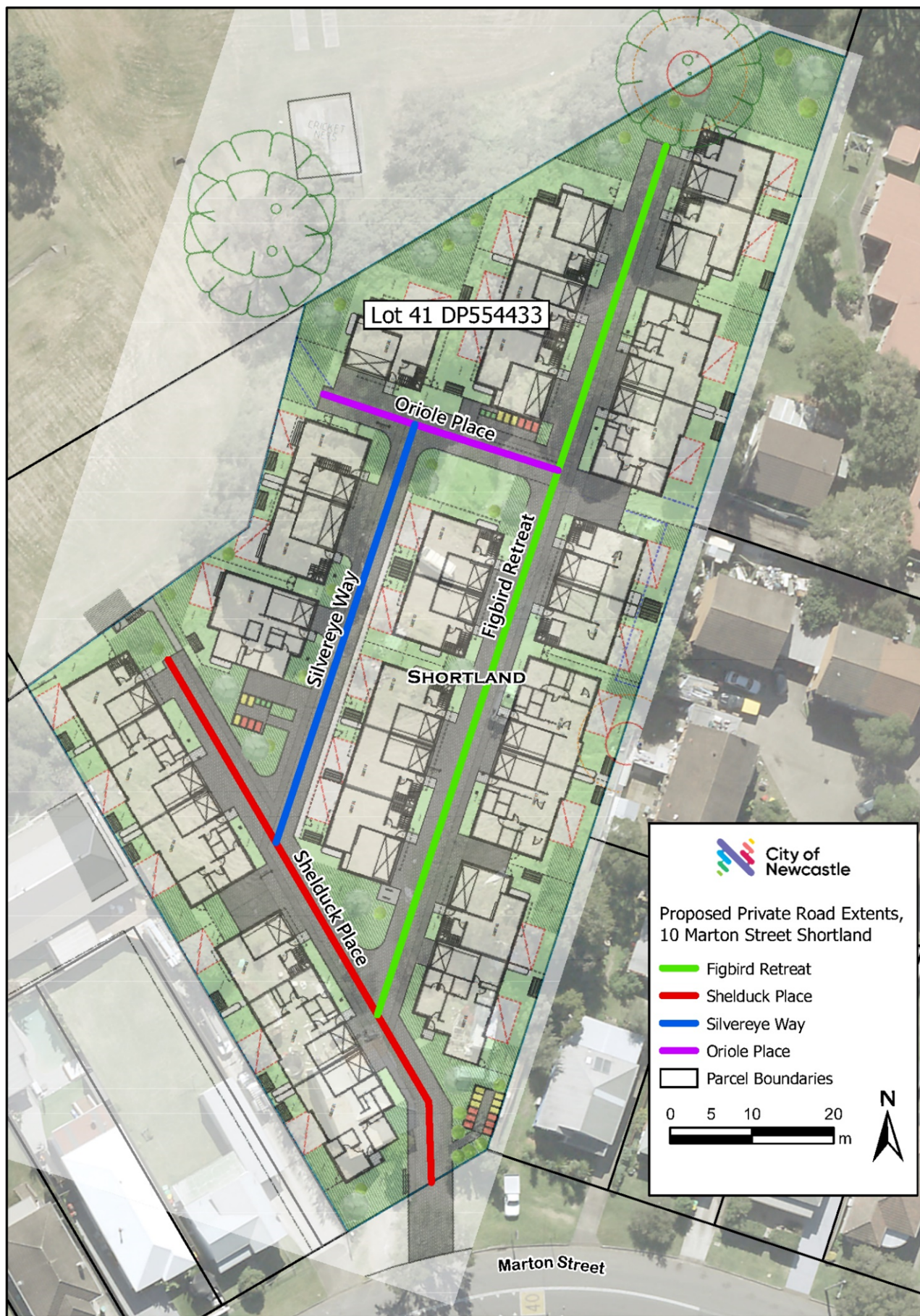
Exhibition

City of Newcastle is proposing road names for four (4) new private roads in Shortland.

This is a new multi-dwelling residential development. These private roads need to be named to facilitate addressing and to aid emergency service location and service delivery. Please see the below table and attached location map (Attachment 1):

| | Proposed Road Name | Name Origin | Description |
|----|--------------------|---|--|
| 1. | Shelduck Place | The road is named after the radjah shelduck, a native species of bird that can be found in the nearby Hunter Wetlands. | The road begins at its intersection with Marton Street, and continues in a north-western direction for 72 metres before coming to an end. |
| 2. | Figbird Retreat | The road is named after the Australasian figbird, a native species of bird that can be found in the nearby Hunter Wetlands. | The road begins where it intersects with Shelduck Place, and continues in a north-eastern direction for 112 metres before coming to an end. |
| 3. | Silvereve Way | The road is named after the silvereve, a native species of bird that can be found in the nearby Hunter Wetlands. | The road begins where it intersects with Shelduck Place and continues in a north-eastern direction for 54 metres, before ending where it intersects with Oriole Place. |
| 4. | Oriole Place | The road is named after the olive-backed oriole, a native species of bird that can be found in the nearby Hunter Wetlands. | The road begins where it intersects with Figbird Retreat and continues in a western direction for 30 metres before coming to an end. |

Submissions

Any person, during the specified submission period, may make submissions to the City of Newcastle concerning the proposed road names. The submissions must specify:

- the grounds of objection (if any).
- quote 'Shortland Road Naming – February 2022' in the title of the submission.
- include the submitter's name, address, and daytime contact number; and
- where possible, an email address.

Please note: Submissions will only be considered that directly relate to the proposed road names. Any references to the approved development are unable to be considered as part of this road naming process.

Submissions must be made in writing and submitted via e-mail or post. Where possible, City of Newcastle prefers to communicate with submitters via email to support sustainable environmental practices and improved timeliness of any correspondence.
